Because of the Covid-19 Pandemic, it has been a very difficult year with many challenges for OST, our staff, volunteers and for our members



Lockdown meant that we had to close our Hub. All our groups had to stop.



The rules put in place to keep everyone safe have been hard for many people but particularly people with learning disabilities.



People have been lonely at home alone. Some people have been anxious and scared about the virus. Some people have found understanding and following the rules difficult.



But OST has risen to the challenges of the pandemic.







Our new Director, Alex, and new Chair of trustees, Sarah, worked on some new goals for OST.

Some of our team have new roles to help us achieve these goals.



We ran a lockdown support service so we could stay in touch with our members and help people when they needed it.



We were given funding to give members tablets so they could join in OST sessions online



We found new ways to work together; online, on the phone, doorstop visits and in a group when we were allowed to.



As the rules are changing, we are helping members come back to OST again.







Sadly our storytelling company had to cancel their Fanny Fust and Peter, the Wild Boy tour



But we found a new way to perform, with a mix of film and live performance.



We ran our sessions and day services online and opened up our Hub again when we were allowed.



We ran our sensory book clubs online and sent out resource packs. Memory People took a long break but is now up and running again



We launched a new social enterprise called Pigeon Productions. It will make complicated information easy to understand through film, pictures and easy read. It will also provide work opportunities for our members.





## **Our Year in Numbers**

 ${f 50}$  individuals with learning disabilities were supported OpenStoryTellers employed  ${f 2}$  individuals with lived experience of learning disability and freelance employment for  ${f 2}$  graphic artists with a learning disability or autism

Over  ${f 100}$  Zoom sessions delivered and  ${f 52}$  face to face sessions delivered. To the digitally excluded:  ${f 14}$  digital devices,  ${f 12}$  sets of headphones and wi-fi mini hub were distributed.

f 1 media studio was created at OpenStoryTellers, f 1 social enterprise established, f 1 new Chair of Trustees welcomed and the  $f 1^{st}$  online Bardic Chair Storytelling Competition was hosted by The Storytelling Company

We have 8 trustees.






In this year we had 2 trustees leave OST
